VIII. New Business:

A. Jeff Hackenberg, Client Relationship Manager, Penn State Extension – introducing Clarissa Beaver, Nutrition Education Advisor

Mr. Hackenberg introduced Clarissa Beaver, the new Nutrition Education Advisor with Penn State Extension.

Ms. Beaver then spoke about the Nutrition Education program. She mentioned it provides research-based nutrition education to help people and families with limited resources to enhance their nutrition and increase their physical activity and develop life skills needed for self-sufficiency and better health. Classes include hands-on activities and cooking demonstrations. She also stated there is data available that demonstrates the effectiveness of the program's impact on participants' behavior in food selection, dietary intake and management of resources and food safety. She has started classes at CareerLink and has begun to reach out to other community agencies including Head Start and local food banks. She will cover Mifflin, Juniata and parts of Huntingdon Counties. She discussed that the classes are very successful and rewarding. She mentioned that class times vary depending on what is convenient for participants. She also stated that most classes are very small at this point, but she expects to see an increase as the program gets up and running.

Mr. Hackenberg thanked the Commissioners and the people of Mifflin County for their support.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 27 of 2020

RESOLUTION OF THE MIFFLIN COUNTY COMMISSIONERS (MCC) APPROVING BUDGET REVISIONS TO THE FFY 2016 CDBG PROGRAM

WHEREAS the (MCC) funded the single-family housing rehabilitation program in FFY 2016 in the amount of \$46,136.00 and the Big Brother/Big Sisters of Juniata Valley-youth mentoring project in 2016, in the amount of \$12,220.00.

WHEREAS, the Big Brother/Big Sisters of Juniata Valley-youth mentoring project is finished and excess funds in the amount of \$3,734.56 in FFY 2016 remain and the MCC are desirous of allocating the excess funds of \$3,734.56 to the FFY 2016 single-family housing rehabilitation program which will now total \$49,870.56;

WHEREAS, it is the requirement of the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (PA-DCED), to revise the Mifflin County's 2016 program funding budgets, so as to complete the following actions:

- 1. Decrease the FFY 2016 Big Brother/Big Sisters of Juniata Valley-youth mentoring project in the amount of \$3,734.56 and
- 2. Increase the already approved FFY 2016 single-family housing rehabilitation program by \$3,734.56 which will now total \$49,870.56;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the MCC:

- 1. That the program budget revisions affecting the Mifflin County 2016 program budgets are approved through the adoption of this resolution.
- 2. That the Mifflin County Planning and Development Department is authorized to complete and submit said revision request and required documentation to the (PADCED) for review and approval.

Mr. Lettiere discussed these are budget revisions to the FFY 2016 CDBG Program. The Big Brothers/Big Sisters program was funded through a fair-share allocation, which is proportional to the population of each entitlement municipality in 2016. In June, notification was received that they were having program and financial problems and they decided to terminate the program in Mifflin and Juniata Counties. There are now excess monies that need to be reallocated to other eligible projects so the funds can be expended in a timely manner and these Resolutions take care of that.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kodish to approve Resolution No's. 24 through 27 of 2020 approving budget revisions to the FFY 2016 CDBG Program. Chairman Sunderland seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

G. Intergovernmental Agreement between the County of Mifflin, Mifflin County Sheriff and Mifflin County Domestic Relations for the Sheriff's Office to provide Security at Domestic Relations

Ms. Cherry is requesting to have someone from the Sheriff's Office attend the Domestic Relations conferences three days a week. Conferences are held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and half-days on Thursdays which equates to roughly 12 hours per week. The hours vary and the wages will vary depending on which member of the Sheriff's Office will be attending.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kodish to approve the Intergovernmental Agreement between the County of Mifflin, Mifflin County Sheriff and Mifflin County Domestic Relations for the Sheriff's Office to provide Security at Domestic Relations. Chairman Sunderland seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

H. Cooperation Agreement between Mifflin County and the Mifflin County Academy of Science and Technology for the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP)

Mr. Baker discussed that the County applied for a \$2.5 Million grant through the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program. The County is the applicant for the grant.

\$1 Million is earmarked for renovations at the Annex, part of which is aimed at improving security by enabling Domestic Relations to move back into the Courthouse. The remaining \$1.5 Million of the grant is for the Mifflin County Academy. Because the County is the applicant and has to receive the money on behalf of the Academy as the sub-recipient, the County has to have an agreement in place that dictates the terms of the arrangement for the County to act as the pass-through for the \$1.5 Million.

Solicitor Snook reiterated that it is exactly how Mr. Baker described it. The County is the applicant for the entire grant and we have to work with the Academy for their share of it. This just says how we'll work together. He doesn't anticipate any problems with this agreement.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kodish to approve the Cooperation Agreement between Mifflin County and the Mifflin County Academy of Science and Technology for the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP). Chairman Sunderland seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

I. COSTARS Enrollment Electricity Procurement Services

Mr. Baker explained that currently the County has a broker that negotiates an electricity price for us. This is an alternative means for using a broker. It's a group out of Penn State that works with COSTARS. The end result will be opting into the program only if they can secure a better kilowatt per hour rate for all of the County electric accounts. If they can't obtain a better rate, the County will stay with the current broker.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kodish to approve the COSTARS Enrollment Electricity Procurement Services. Chairman Sunderland seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

J. Personnel:

- Hiring of part-time Deputy Sheriff, Linsey Landis effective February 7, 2020
- Appointment of Tyler Stein as an intern in the Crime Victim Services Office effective March 17, 2020

Motion was made by Commissioner Kodish to accept the above personnel items. Chairman Sunderland seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.
